FROM THE DEACON

I am writing to you while returning from my week at Nashotah House Theological Seminary where I have begun my next course of study in Church History. One of the historical elements of our faith has been the practice of ascetical disciplines. A quick search of literature will show that there have been many extreme practices throughout the ages. As the celebrations of Christmas and the New Year wane we often begin the practice of resolutions we made for the new year, resolutions that for some of us are broken sometime in March.

I don't know about the rest of you, but I learned a long time ago not to make promises I don't plan to keep. Sometimes this is phrased "can't" keep. Intention and ability are two different things. One who knows they cannot keep a promise made and makes the promise regardless is different than attempting to keep the promise and failing. The same goes for resolutions and ascetical disciplines; we try but we can't keep the discipline or resolution. We have an example of this in scripture when we hear Paul say I do not understand my own actions. For I do not do what I want, but I do the very thing I hate. For I do not do the good I want, but the evil I do not want is what I do. (Romans 7:15,19).

Ash Wednesday is March 1st, which means Lent will begin before some of you receive the next Trumpet. As we wind our way through the remainder of this Epiphanytide and approach Lent now is the time to start considering some resolutions or disciplines to practice during

Lent that may be achievable. Ask God, what can I do to show you my love of you, not what will I give up. Then make a promise to God to try to do it. Sometimes this takes the form of extra prayer or just extra time praying, reading a book with a spiritual message, attending a Bible study, organizing a Bible study, going to an extra church service in a week, perhaps saying the Daily Office or talking to that person we avoid.

Talk your plan over with someone you trust that can help you figure out what you want to do and with whom you can discuss that you are having trouble keeping your promise. Sometimes this discipline may take the form of giving. Consider giving a little extra for the hungry or homeless, feeding a neighbor, cleaning that closet and donate the unused clothing to a ministry, skip one meal and donate what it would have cost to a pantry.

Paul also tells us after he confesses to doing the very thing he doesn't want to do, that "There is therefore now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus. ² For the law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus has set me free from the law of sin and death." (Romans 8:1-2)

To take on a special discipline during Lent is not so that we should feel condemned if we mess it up, it is so that we can rejoice that God has already forgiven us and to remind us that our humanity needs a Saviour. If you mess up, confess it and try again. There is an old joke about two abbots discussing what life is like in each other's monastery. The one abbot says to the other abbot, "The usual, we fall down and we get up."

My prayer for each of you is that your Lenten preparation is Holy and Blessed.
