From Father Frank Lockwood:

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ;

In the early spring of 2011, I was sent to a conference in California. It was held at Bethel Church, a large charismatic organization. The campus of the church is very large. It boasts several classrooms, counseling rooms and other buildings including a large "worship space" that is about the size of a large gym. Their worship style is a bit different then our own. There is no pageantry or formalized uniform prayers. Instead, it is a bit less formal with a lot of prayer and perhaps a bit of emotionalism involved.

The music that is used often is criticized by other religious leaders. They are accused of not being "Christian" enough in the words they use or in the tunes they present with. While I was there, one of the musicians during the conference was a man by the name of Jake Hamilton. Jake's appearance is more of a truck driver than a "worship leader". He is a bigger man with a baseball cap, tattoos and a raspy voice. He plays electric guitar as he leads people in simple yet deeply penetrating praise choruses as well as revisiting some songs that were originally presented by others, one such song was sung by a female worship leader originally. She has a beautiful and lofty voice. It is almost angelic. Yet, when Jake performs it, it takes on a raw tone. His rasp penetrates and shakes the words.

While he was leading music, he paused at one time. He said that there were many there who might be called to be leaders within the church. Perhaps even leaders of music. However, he cited many other worship leaders and spoke to the crowd gathered that they were not called to be duplicates of these already prominent leaders. He said that they were being called to be leaders as they are, That each of us presents to the world a face (style) of worship that might appeal to a particular individual or individuals that otherwise would not hear the message. One of the lines from his song, The Anthem, says that "you were born for such a time as this", quoting from the book of Esther the words her uncle used.

Each of us who believe are a face of Christ to the world. You may be the only Jesus that someone ever meets. You may be <u>the face</u> that someone needs to see so that whatever dim spark may dwell deep within a person is fanned. Each of us who is a Christian is called to present the gospel to the world. We are called to share the good news. What is not said is how we are to do that. At least not the specifics of it. Why?

Because the relationship that each of us has with the Father through the Son is a personal relationship. It has been shaped by the paths each of us has walked and is a culmination of all for each individual. My relationship with the Father is not the same as what yours might be. Perhaps we have similar elements in our relationship, perhaps slightly different elements and perhaps even greatly different elements. The only common thread that each of us should have is that we have come to the Father through His Son, Jesus Christ.

I share this with you by way of encouragement. Your story when combined with His story is a story that will speak mightily to those for whom it is meant. He has brought you to this point, or perhaps to a point in the future (maybe even many points in the future) for "such a time as this." That your story shared with the right person will be exactly what they need in order to encourage their own story.

This also, and we can flesh this out at a later time, some of the reasons that someone maybe you have been through some of those things you have been through. One cannot know the beauty of a sunrise without first seeing the darkness that precedes it.

I pray that you might take encouragement from this.

Report to Church of Our Saviour on The 156th Diocesan Convention

The 156th Albany Diocesan Convention was held on the beautiful grounds of Silver Bay YMCA, on

northern Lake George, over the weekend of May 31 through June 2, 2024. The was the first convention led by our new Bishop, Jeremiah Williamson, and it gave a large number of people a chance to meet him and hear his thoughts.

The official business was divided over all three days. All business at this convention was fairly routine, and concerned with electing people to offices and resolutions for adding oversight to various church activities. All resolutions passed unanimously.

Friday evening was opening prayer and a speech by the Bishop, which was thoughtful, and at times humorous. This was followed by a sung prayer service led by the Bishop. The Secretary gave instructions to the convention, and the proposed order of business was presented and accepted. The Procedural Motion for the Discussion of Resolutions was made, and there was no discussion. Various reports were presented. Nominations and voting then occurred for Secretary of the Diocese, Treasurer of the Diocese, and Assistant Treasurer of the Diocese. The convention adjourned for the night.

Saturday morning the Bishop invited the Pakistani congregation of Albany on stage to sing some of their hymns for us. The music was quite different, being in a foreign language and using instruments such as Djembe drum, accordion and tambourines! They taught us the meaning of some of the words, and invited everyone to join in.

After this, plurality nominations and vote-by-orders nominations were made, and votes cast for several offices. Because not all candidates had a majority on the first vote, another meeting was held Saturday afternoon. At the afternoon session, resolutions were also read, opened for discussion, closed, and in all cases unanimously passed.

The official business concluded Saturday afternoon, and Saturday evening was filled with visiting, Deanery games, music (several musicians in different locations) and too much wonderful food. Sunday officially closed the convention with the always-popular Youth Mass in the auditorium.
